Layne Rands is a Grade II student who is currently enrolled in the High School Apprenticeship Program. Rands was able to secure an apprenticeship with carpenter Allen Boschman of Hoop and Holler construction which allowed him to begin to collect hours towards his level one carpentry certification. In addition to the authentic apprenticeship hours, Rands is on track to receive all eight of the associated Grade I2 HSAP credits towards high school graduation. Rands enjoys the fact that much of the work is outside and raves about how much he has learned from Boschman. Aside from the acquisition of hard skills such as proper usage of numerous tools, he is also amassing a toolbox filled with valuable soft skills such as effective communication, critical thinking, and problem solving. When it comes to essential skills, it is numeracy that he has found to be at the forefront, "I have to use numeracy skills every day when I am measuring and cutting material for my projects. In order for things to turn out properly, I need to be competent in measurement and basic addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. "

TURNER TAKES A LEADERSHIP ROLE AT CAMP


